Town Trail (Approx. 2 hours)

A fascinating tour through the Town's Conservation Area. Learn the secret of the Tower of Caistor.

Walk up Lucy's Lane, see the Roman Wall, the Home Guard H.Q. and much more.

Butter Market Walk (Approx. 45 minutes)

See the Old Sessions House, the oldest Grammar School in Lincolnshire still used as a Grammar School, National School and first Joint Methodist and Church of England School in the country.

Church Square Walk (Approx. 40 minutes)

A gentle stroll around the area of the Parish Church, walk through the peaceful "Wild Area" see the Roman Wall and some cottages formed from the Tithe Barn.

Cornhill Walk (Approx. 50 minutes)

We talk about the Market Place before the encroachment of buildings and about the Great Fire of Caistor 1681 the Tower of Caistor, some cottages built in 1792, some sympathetic new development, a fine Georgian house Police Station built in 1855 and Wesleyan Chapel 1842 and much more

A Short Tour for Wheelchair Users (Approx. 30 minutes)

An interesting tour around the centre of Caistor with a little extra push where necessary.

Roman and Medieval Caistor (Approx. 90 minutes)

Walk through the town following the line of the Roman Wall and see the evidence of life and death in the Roman fort on the route from Horncastle to the River Humber. We move on to the Domesday Book and Medieval Caistor and learn about its part in the Lincolnshire Rising against Henry V111

.Georgian and Victorian Caistor (Approx. 90 minutes)

The town has a fine Georgian legacy with links to the Tennyson family. Its streets, alleys and market places reveal much about life two and three hundred years ago when Caistor was the finest town of the region.

Chairs, Clocks and Caistor Trades (Approx. 90 minutes)

Caistor was a thriving industrial and trading centre with three market places, more than twenty inns and alehouses and a workhouse which took in the poor from as far away as Grimsby. There is much evidence of the town's flourishing life before the Industrial Revolution changed Britain for ever.

Caistor round and about (Approx. 3 hours easy walk of 4 miles, mainly on flat land)

Take a stroll through the countryside around Caistor, discovering its canal which never quite reached the town. See the site of the workhouse, Caistor holiday camp and the airfield which had a contribution to the Cuban missile crisis.
