Executive Summary

The first County Views survey was distributed to interested individuals from across Greater Lincolnshire between 3 March and 19 April 2020. This survey was an open invitation and is a regular opportunity to share opinions on the area in which people live. The main engagement method was an online survey with alternative formats available on request.

A total of 662 survey responses were received (approximately 0.06% of the Greater Lincolnshire population). This provides baseline data to compare with future County Views surveys. An encouraging number, but not entirely representative of the 10 local authorities' population so be cautious when comparing percentage figures as they can be misleading.

The majority of respondents (60%, 398) were from residents living in West Lindsey. This might be attributable to the fact they have an active residents panel. The lowest response numbers came from the two unitary authorities (1%, 9).

Our thanks go to all survey respondents and the partner authorities that helped to distribute it.

Key findings

- When asked whether their local area is a great place to live, over four fifths (81%, 539) of respondents agreed. Less than one tenth disagreed (9%, 56), but there was variation by authority area (see appendix A).
- The majority of residents who completed the survey (81%, 535) also think Greater Lincolnshire is a great place to live.
- The most important issue to respondents is 'Access to nature, coasts, parks and open spaces' and the issue respondents would most like to see improve is 'Road networks and highway maintenance'.
- The environment is an important issue to a huge majority of respondents (98%, 645) and a similar number (92%, 608) support the idea of a large tree planting programme.
- Respondents were given the chance to provide further comments about the environment and analysis identified a number of emerging themes, such as:

How do you help protect the environment? *'Keep a wild area in my garden. Plant insect friendly plants. Feed hedgehogs. Use no insecticides'*

How do you help protect the environment? *'Avoiding packaging, recycling, growing food, car sharing'*

How do you help protect the environment? *'Regular cycling instead of car, reduce energy consumption'*

What would encourage you to do more for the environment? *'Nothing really, I just do whats (sic) easiest and cheapest for me'*

Summary of Responses

A total of 662 direct survey responses were received. These can be categorised as follows:

The majority of questions were quantitative and have been interrogated to identify patterns, highlight differences in particular local authority areas and ensure representation of the sub-region's population. Over 60% of respondents (404) provided an open text answer to question four, which has been subject to a thematic analysis to look for common themes, such as recycling and alternative transport choices.

There was an almost equal split between those aged 16-64 and 65+, although only just over 22% of Greater Lincolnshire's (ONS mid-2018) estimated population is over 65. The under 16s have previously expressed an interest in being engaged through alternatives to a survey. The zero response rate from this group indicates that we might need to promote the survey differently and/or that existing non-survey mechanisms should be used in future.

Almost 97% of respondents who answered the question about ethnicity described themselves as white, which is broadly representative of the 97.6% white population of the county.

16% of respondents answering the question about disability said they considered themselves to have a disability (101). Almost 45% of the respondents with a disability were aged 16-64 which is 38 percentage points above the actual figure of 6.2%.

Efforts will be focussed on increasing representative views across all areas on future surveys.



On the whole, respondents felt largely positive about their local area in relation to statements. The 81% (539) of respondents agreed (to some extent or strongly) that their local area is a great place to live.

Respondents mostly disagreed with the statement 'my local area roads and transport infrastructure meet my needs' – 58% (382) of respondents disagreed (to some extent or strongly). The strongest disagreement was noted in the Boston Borough, South Kesteven and North Lincolnshire areas, where over three quarters of respondents from each area disagreed with the statement 'in my local area roads and transport infrastructure meet my needs'.

When looking at responses to 'my local area is a great place to live', two thirds (66.6%, 4) of respondents from South Holland disagreed to some extent or strongly. West Lindsey and North East Lincolnshire scored highest with 87% (347) and 86% (6) respectively agreeing strongly or to some extent.

Almost three quarters of respondents (74%, 289) from West Lindsey agreed (strongly or to some extent) that people in their local area treated each other with respect and consideration, compared to a Greater Lincolnshire average of just under two thirds (65%, 426). The chart below shows views by ethnic background where, regardless of ethnicity, most tend to agree that people in their local area treat each other with respect and consideration.



When considering whether 'Lincolnshire is a great place to live', four fifths (81%, 535) tend to agree or agree strongly across Greater Lincolnshire (reflecting proportions in the same statement about their local area in question 1), apart from South Holland where half (50%, 3) respondents tended to disagree or disagreed strongly with the statement.


When considering whether people feel 'councils in Lincolnshire engage, listen and respond', well over half (57.15%, 4) of residents in North East Lincolnshire agreed – the highest of all authority areas. Meanwhile, both respondents from North Lincolnshire (100%, 2) disagreed.

Question 3 Thinking about your local area, which of the things below would you say are most important in making your area a good place to live, and which do you think most need improving?


The top three items respondents rated as most important in making their local area a good place to live were access to nature, coast, parks and open spaces; education provision; and safety.



The top three items respondents felt most needed improvement in their local area were road networks and highway maintenance; public transport; and job prospects.




In the chart below we observe a negative correlation between the importance of services and the need to improve services. The services voted as the most important in making the area a good place to live were also seen as needing least improvement. Equally, services that the respondents felt need improving the most were assessed as less important. This suggests the local authorities in Greater Lincolnshire focus on the things that matter most to the residents.



Question 4 How often, if ever, do you make choices that help protect the environment?

- If all the time or some of the time – Please tell us how
- If not too often or not at all – Please tell us what would encourage you to do more



There were 404 valid responses, of which almost three quarters (73%, 296) recycle, with little variation across the local authority areas.

126 (31%) have made changes with respect to their transport choices, including 51 (13%) who walk instead of making car journeys and 37 (9%) who use public transport.

71 (18%) have made choices involving energy changes, including 21 (5%) who have introduced renewable energy options, such as solar panels.

One quarter (25%, 101) mentioned changing their shopping habits, either by buying local produce or by choosing products with less plastic packaging. People also mentioned that they shopped wisely to reduce waste.

85 (21%) referred to other choices that they had made to protect the environment including educating children about eco-friendly lifestyles, reducing flying and avoiding the use of chemicals in the garden and house.

Question 5 Would you be in favour of a large tree planting programme to run in Greater Lincolnshire over the next 3-5 years?



Conclusions and next steps

The response rate was encouraging for a trial Greater Lincolnshire survey. The exercise has helped to provide a baseline of people's views on life in the greater Lincolnshire area. There were some different opinions, but mostly positives and ideas for areas to focus future efforts.

Recommendations

Target under represented areas to ensure views fairly reflect the whole of Greater Lincolnshire.

Target young people (under 16s in particular) by using a different method of engagement to ensure their voice is heard too, as their priorities might differ to adults.

The brief format and number of questions yielded a good response so the format should remain broadly the same.

Include Covid-19 response questions in the next survey to establish people's views on local reaction, information and what we could do if a similar situation arose again. This could complement, but not duplicate, the research Healthwatch carried out during lockdown.

Consider results and how themes and topics can be addressed. This should be added to the outcomes of the survey and this report so respondents are aware of the impact their answers have. For example, more communications, such as those to be featured in County News, about the extent of work done to improve the roads.

Include a summary of survey results in County News to encourage participation, promote future surveys and demonstrate impact.

What next...

This report will be presented to Lincolnshire County Council's Leader and the corporate leadership team for consideration and next steps. This report will also be shared with partner authorities for their consideration.

The first County Views survey has now closed, but it is anticipated (Covid-19 dependent) that the next survey will be available in July 2020. The focus will be establishing our own countywide panel so that we can ensure a more representative response.

Appendix A: Notes to reader

1. Background

County Views, March 2020 was the first survey of its type in Greater Lincolnshire, aimed at collecting baseline data. It asked nine questions about the area in which the respondent lives and their background, including where they live, ethnicity and disability.

The survey will be repeated three times per year (March, July and November) to enable comparison and monitoring over time. It is open to anyone living in the sub-region with promotion done by direct email by Lincolnshire County Council across Lincolnshire and the other authorities in their own areas as they wish.

2. Engagement Objectives

General views by authority area and demography, which can be compared and tracked over time.

Highlight key themes by geography or demographics and areas of focus for the future.

Monitor outcomes against corporate plans.

Capture data on behalf of partner authorities in Greater Lincolnshire to provide insight and better utilise resources effectively.

3. Stakeholders

As an initial trial survey, the questionnaire was openly promoted across authority networks and panels. The nature of open promotion and access to anyone, rather than a random or representative sample, means that the responses are not spread proportionately across geography or demography. For example, roughly 16% of Lincolnshire's population lives in West Lindsey, but 60% of responses were received from people in that district and 18.5% of the estimated population of Greater Lincolnshire is aged 0-15, but there was a zero response rate from this group. Conversely, 6.2% of working aged people consider themselves to be disabled, and 7.1% of respondents aged 16-64 had a disability while 2.4% of the population is non-white and 3% of respondents to the survey were non-white. We cannot be confident at this early stage that the data and views gathered are representative of the wider population across each authority area, county or the sub-region.

4. Methods and channels used

- An online SNAP survey was the primary means of participation with a paper version available if required.
- The survey consisted three benchmarking questions, two themed/service-specific litmus test questions, which will vary each time and four demographic questions.
- There was low key promotion across organisational social media channels.
- A series of bespoke emails were sent out to a wide ranging stakeholder database via Mailchimp and promoted using pre-existing newsletters.
- A number of stakeholders, including local councillors and voluntary sector organisations, were specifically targeted with emails.


5. Detailed results analysis (benchmarking questions 1-3)



When looking at responses to 'my local area is a great place to live', two thirds (66.5%, 4) of respondents from South Holland disagreed to some extent or strongly (although such a low number of responses overall means that the data is not statistically reliable or representative).


West Lindsey and North East Lincolnshire scored highest with 87% (347) and 86% (6) respectively agreeing strongly or to some extent. Many more people responded in West Lindsey so confidence in the data can be stronger, although it still only represents half of one per cent of the district population.

People in my local area treat each other with respect and consideration




Both respondents from North Lincolnshire disagreed that people in their local area treated each other with respect and half of the respondents in Boston Borough and South Holland district disagreed (eight and three respectively). This corresponds directly with whether people think their local area is a great place to live and if people feel their community doesn't have a strong voice or opportunities to make a difference in their area. 69% (11) of respondents from Boston Borough felt they didn't have a voice, compared to the 34% (222) average across Greater Lincolnshire. The further south people live, the less likely they are to agree with this statement.

Lincolnshire is a great place to live




'Lincolnshire is a great place to live' is the statement that scored the highest with 81% (535) agreeing across Greater Lincolnshire. However, in South Holland 50% (3) responders tended to disagree or disagree strongly with the statement. All (100%, 2) respondents from North Lincolnshire and 85% (339) from West Lindsey tended to agree or strongly agreed.

Lincolnshire is a place where people can fulfil aspirations for their lives and their communities




86% (6) responders from North East Lincolnshire along with 55% (74) from Lincoln and 50% (2) from North Lincolnshire tended to agree or strongly agreed with the statement that 'Lincolnshire is a place where people can fulfil aspirations for their lives and their communities'. The highest numbers in disagreement were from South Holland (67%, 4) and Boston Borough (50%, 8).

Lincolnshire is a great place for starting and building a career




North Lincolnshire and North East Lincolnshire scored highest with 100% (2) and 71% (5) respectively strongly agreeing or tending to agree with the statement that 'Lincolnshire is a great place for starting and building a career'. In South Holland 83% (5) and East Lindsey 62% (37) respondents tended to disagree or disagreed strongly with the statement.

People in Lincolnshire have access to good-value council services



'People in Lincolnshire have access to good-value council services' scored highest in North East Lincolnshire with 71% (5) respondents agreeing with the statement and 46% (61) Lincoln. In South Kesteven 69% (11) respondents disagreed with the statement. No respondents from South Kesteven agreed or strongly agreed with the statement.


People in Lincolnshire are able to live independently accessing the right support when they need it



People in Lincolnshire are able to live independently accessing the right support when they need it was rated highest in North East Lincolnshire where 43% (3) of respondents tended to agree or strongly agree with the statement. In South Kesteven and Boston Borough 56% (9) of responders tended to disagree or strongly disagreed.


Please note that 45% - overall response for don't know, neither agree or disagree and no answer (don't know it is the highest of all questions with 13%).

Councils in Lincolnshire engage, listen and respond to people




The statement 'Councils in Lincolnshire engage, listen and respond to people' was rated by 37% of respondents who tend to disagree or disagree strongly. Both respondents from North Lincolnshire (100%, 2) and 83% (5) from South Holland disagreed most. The areas with highest levels of agreement were North East Lincolnshire (57%, 4), Lincoln (29%, 39) and West Lindsey (26%, 105).

Lincolnshire offers good leisure, tourism and cultural activities



Lincolnshire offers good leisure, tourism and cultural activities scored highest in Lincoln (60%, 81) and West Lindsey (54%, 215), whereas the lowest ratings were given by South Holland (67%, 4) where respondents tended to disagree or strongly disagreed with the statement. In two districts there was an equal split between tend to agree or strongly agree and tend to disagree or strongly disagree with 50% (1) respectively in North Lincolnshire and 37.5% (6) in Boston Borough.

Community and voluntary groups in Lincolnshire have the opportunity to thrive



North East Lincolnshire and West Lindsey rated 'Community and voluntary groups in Lincolnshire have the opportunity to thrive' highest with 57.15 % (4) and 45.23% (180) respectively, agreeing with the statement. Whereas, in North Lincolnshire and South Holland 50% of responders (1 and 3, respectively) disagreed with the statement.

































Key highlights:

- 404 valid responses, of which 296 (73%) recycle
- 126 (31%) have made changes with respect to their transport choices, including 51 (13%) who are walking instead of making car journeys and 37 (9%) who use public transport
- 71 (18%) have made choices involving energy changes including 21 (5%) who have introduced renewable energy options such as solar panels
- 101 (25%) mentioned changing their shopping habits, either by buying local produce or by choosing products with less plastic packaging. People also mentioned that they shopped wisely to reduce waste
- 85 (21%) referred to other choices that they had made to protect the environment including educating children about eco-friendly lifestyles, reducing flying and avoiding the use of chemicals in the garden and house




Age group
